If community is based on shared experiences, the world has certainly got a lot smaller

If the past year has taught us one thing it is the power of togetherness, even when physically apart we can still play an important role in something great. We have laughed with strangers, smiled at neighbours, stood on our doorsteps together and clapped, we have taken part in virtual book clubs and joined online cookery classes, we have volunteered, we have held conversations with strangers on our daily walks and we know the term Zoom meetings will forever be embedding in our brains.

We have learnt new meanings to the word community and at the same time come to understand its true power. Community allows us to interact, it allows us to share experiences and support one another, community is what provides us with the foundations to build valuable relationships and allows us to enjoy a sense of belonging. This sense of belonging is what makes us who we are and who we can become.

During the first lockdown the Merlin MS Centre was forced to close its doors, meaning the place that meant so much to so many could no longer offer a haven of security, a place of belonging. The Centre provides vital services to many people, stopping services altogether was not an option. Through the application of emergency funding the therapy team were able to start providing a 'Keep In Touch' service, offering exercise classes online as well as phone calls to the most vulnerable. The lack of in person support and interaction was very apparent in many service users and thankfully, deemed as an essential service, the Centre was able to open its doors again in July 2020 and has remained open since.

The impact of the pandemic on the charity sector has been devastating and Merlin MS Centre will feel this impact for many years to come. Our mission however remains the same, to continue to provide and all-inclusive Centre of support to people with long-term neurological conditions across the County. We are proud of the community we and our amazing supporters have built over the years and we hope that with a shift in the true meaning of community spirit, that many more people will want to join us in securing the services we provide to the people of Cornwall now and in the future.

There are many ways in which you can bring your community together to support us. We have recently launched a lovely fundraiser to get people together again in the form of our BBQ Challenge, where we are asking people to (following current guidelines) gather their friends to host a garden party or BBQ or organise a community cookout.

CORNISH LIVES Violetta Thurstan - 4th February 1879 - 13 April 1978 First World War nurse, educator & textile pioneer

Violetta Thurstan, born as the eldest child of a medical doctor in 1879 in Sussex, lived a long life that was touched by some of the most notable historical events of the 20th century. She and her three younger brothers travelled with their parents and were educated partly abroad; maybe this was the seed of Violetta's interest in, and talent for, language which widened her horizons beyond that thought 'typical' for women at that time.


As a young woman, Violetta gained experience, and then trained in, the nursing profession, one of the few avenues open to young, unmarried women which allowed them respectably leave the family home prior to marriage. Violetta received her Honorary certificate for nursing in 1905, from the London Hospital at Whitechapel, then worked in the UK and Greece in the following two years. Perhaps inspired by experiences or people she met on these travels, in 1907 Violetta began studying via distance-learning courses provided by St Andrews University. Over the next six years, Violetta received awards in French, Geography and English all to Honour's standard, and Fine Art and physiology to a pass grade - an impressive academic achievement, and one which demonstrates Violetta's determination and intelligence.

At the outbreak of the First World War, Violetta was called up for service in the British Red Cross Society, and after an initial posting in the UK, was sent to work in Brussels. Her experiences in the following years were intense: within 24 hours of arrival, she had been taken hostage by the Germans who were poised to enter Brussels, but found a useful outlet for her nursing skills as Matron at a large hospital outside Charolais, where she nursed French and German casualties for many weeks with little equipment and even less chance to rest, until she and her fellow nurses were impelled to leave and were exchanged at the Danish border.

At this juncture, in October 1914, Violetta could have opted to travel home to the UK, but instead she volunteered with the Russian Red Cross – first at a hospital in Warsaw, then with the Volkonsky Flying Field Ambulance – which took her close to intense fighting in and around Lodz. Violetta learnt enough Russian to work alongside her fellow medics and drivers, and tended to catastrophic injuries in very challenging and often primitive conditions. The intensity of the experience drew her close to those she worked alongside, including a Russian ambulance driver, Nicholas, who she portrays as a romantic interest in her book 'The Hounds of War Unleashed'. Sadly, their relationship did not have time to develop; Nicholas was shot and killed while driving his ambulance near the front line, in July 1915, at around the same time that Violetta and her colleagues were awarded the St George Medal in recognition of their service in the field.

Violetta had a period of recuperation from septic poisoning in the UK in early 1915, during which time she wrote 'The People who Run' about war refugees. She had returned to Russia by 1916 to help with distribution of medical to the refugees who had fled from the advancing Russian army, and subsequently in Belgium as the Matron of a 1000 bed hospital at La Panne for nine months, until symptoms of shell-shock necessitated her return to England in October 1917. Her final engagement with the First World War was as a matron in Macedonia, where she worked for six months until June 1918.

After the war, perhaps following-up some contacts made during her recuperation in Denmark in 1914, Violetta trained in weaving for 6 months in Sweden and a dedication to handcrafts was to be a pervasive theme in her life thereafter. In the early 1920s she was appointed as the Director of the Bedouin Industries for the Egyptian government: the length of her stay in Egypt is not clear –

she left this post in either 1924 or 1927 – but her influence during her stay there was strongly felt, and she must have had many and varied experiences which were unusual for a single woman in that time.

In the interlude between the two world wars, Violetta lived first in Somerset, then in Dartford, Devon, where she kept up her interest in weaving, in which she also gave courses, but also exhibited her work, travelled, and published two books: in 1930, 'Vegetable Dyes for beginners', a book that is still in demand today, and in 1934, 'A short history of decorative textiles'. Violetta was travelling in Spain at the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War in 1937, and was expelled from Almeria.

As the build-up towards the Second World War continued, Violetta joined the Women's Royal Voluntary Service (WRVS) with a brief to take responsibility for educational duties. She travelled extensively in the UK to recruit members, set up Centres, gave lectures and organised social events, some of which were based on her handicraft talents. Her extensive knowledge of languages was put to good use when she worked with the Navy, searching ships coming in to Falmouth. She formally left Service in 1944, and then enrolled with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Association (UNRRA), working to help those displaced by the war – a complex task, made more difficult by the movement of national boarders at the end of the war, and the scarcity of official personal documents of those who had fled their homes. Violetta worked between Egypt, Italy, Libya and Austria, where her knowledge of the languages and cultures of these countries, gained earlier in her life, must have been extremely important. Her role with the UNRRA did not come to an end until 1948, when Violetta was in her early fifties.

From the late 1940s until the mid 1960s, Violetta lived in Flushing, Cornwall. In 1955, she was a founder member of the Cornish Guild of Weavers, Spinners and Dyers, and their President from 1957 until her death. Violetta also set up her own school of weaving at her house (Mary Mount) in Flushing, and continued to be active in giving lectures, exhibiting her work and publishing another book ('Weaving without tears' in 1956), in addition to finding time to follow her Catholic faith, and be President of the Women's Catholic League of Cornwall between 1960-63.


By June 1966, Violetta was living at the Old Mill in Penryn with a female companion/housekeeper, Kathleen Defee, who developed a friendship with Violetta that lasted until her death. She published a novel that year, 'The Foolish Virgin', and travelled in Greece to advise on the revival of weaving as a source of economic regeneration, seemingly unimpeded by her advancing years: she was 88 years young!

Violetta continued to play a very active role in the crafting community, giving talks and tutoring courses in her early nineties, and advising a participant in 1971 that bilberries were excellent for giving a rich purple colour "if you can bear not to make them in to a pie". She still travelled overseas, and had extensive involvement with the creation of The Dyers Garden at Probus, north of Truro, in 1976, but which sadly closed in 2004. In 1977, five days after her 97th birthday, Violetta gave a talk to the Guild, and attended the Guild's AGM in Probus in March 1978, a month before she passed away. Her obituary noted that 'Her fragile appearance masked an indomitable spirit' – undoubtedly true, and her lasting legacy of books gives us an insight to her interests, and inspiration to follow her determined pursuit of that which is important to us.



IN THE GARDEN IN JUNE

We've certainly got the rain we needed but it has been an unusual start to the year weather wise. Still frosts in May and temperatures have yet to be turned up which is shocking with the longest day just around the corner.

It is looking promising that the shows will be able to go ahead but with the RHS Chelsea Flower Show delayed until October. Hampton Court will be the first show this year in July. but also

Britain In Bloom is able to go ahead too but for my national judging it will take a different format and judging will be undertaken remotely.

Jobs for June

- Keep on top of weeding. Weed regularly. Try using a hoe it is a quick and easy method!
- Stake tall or floppy perennials.
- Position summer hanging baskets and tubs outside. Keep them well watered, feed and deadheaded.
- Plant out summer bedding.
- Mow lawns at least once a week.
- Harvest early potatoes, lettuce, radish and other salad crops.
- Collect rain water for watering on dry days.
- Earth up potatoes.
- Now is the time to start sowing winter bedding plants; wallflowers, pansy and bellis.
- Weekly feed house plants.
- Prune back perennials that have finished flowering to encourage new leaf growth.
- Regularly tie in, feed and pinch out the side shoots of tomatoes.
- Your roses should now be starting to flower, regularly deadhead them to encourage lots of healthy new buds and keep watch for the first signs of black spot and aphids.
- Now is an ideal time to prune most hedges. Check for nesting birds. Keep a flat even top and don't forget to remove any weeds underneath that will be stealing the nutrients..

The Chelsea Chop

Now is the time of year to consider the 'Chelsea Chop'. It is a simple pruning method that delays flowering and makes plants more compact. There are two methods; the first is to reduce the height of the entire plant by a third, the second, is to prune some of the plants stems by a third (this extends the flowering season). Suitable plants include Nepeta, Sedum, Asters, Monarda, Lavendula, Echinacea purpurea, Artemisia, Phlox, Helianthus and Rudbeckia.







MH declared an interest in Agenda Item 8, PA21/02996 (Hazeldene)

Public Session:

Mr J Humphries spoke in support of the application for Hazeldene for a change of use from a dwelling for an agricultural worker to an open market dwelling. He also thanked the Parish Council for their support in moving the zip wire, commented that the eco-area in Tinners Croft is an eyesore and should be better maintained by Ocean Housing & advised that Trewithen Estates would support the installation of a new dog bin at Shepherds if the proposed location is on Trewithen Land.

MH spoke against the Hazeldene application. A suitable tenant was put forward which demonstrates that there is still a need for dwellings for agricultural workers.

Cornwall Council Report:

Cllr. Harvey advised that the Conservatives will take control of Cornwall Council on Tuesday 18th May. The new cabinet will also be voted in at this meeting.

EG asked AH to find out why the approved retail park at The Goldings in Newquay had not yet been built. AH said he could not contact the Planning Officer as it was not his Ward.

EG also asked AH to follow-up on a meeting he attended regarding Community SpeedWatch. The initiatives discussed have never come to fruition. KY commented that this was because the Council did not have the budget to undertake what was promised. He hoped that the Council would reintroduce the Town & Parish Council Highway Meetings. AH asked EG to send the query in writing so that he could action.

(ii) MH will look at the benches in the Recreation Ground to see if they can be repaired. (ii) The Clerk had circulated a list of works arising from the Playground Risk Assessments. The works were mainly the tightening of screws & bolts. The Mitchell work is in hand and the Clerk will send the SNE list to DL to action. ESP had contacted Kompan regarding the rotten swing timbers in the MPA as they are still under guarantee. Kompan will undertake their own risk assessment

EAST WHEAL ROSE MEMORIAL WEEKEND

The 10th of July sees the 175th Anniversary of the East Wheal Rose Mining Disaster where sadly 39 miners lost their lives. The Parish Council is working with local organisations including the Churches, Lappa Valley, The Pheasant & the School to organise a program of events for this weekend. A full program will be announced shortly.

In the meantime, the Parish Council would like to encourage local residents to decorate their houses/front gardens over the weekend of $9^{th}-11^{th}$ July to show their support for the event. Thank you for your support.

- (iv) RS advised that the quote for the new play equipment in SNE had gone up by about £8k. It had been decided to refurbish the park one side at a time as this was more financially viable. The group is busy fundraising but is still short on funds. They are also waiting for a new quote from the people who installed the zip wire who have proposed an alternative safety surface which is much cheaper. NOTED.
- (c) Adoption of the Amenity Space in St. Francis Meadow & Tree Works: The Clerk advised that the transfer has now been completed. A whole program of treeworks is urgently required, particularly as one local resident had had their car damaged by a fallen branch. The Clerk has got a revised quote from Tony Philps. RESOLVED: To proceed with works. ESP advised that the MVA would like to like to undertake some treeplanting and extend the fencing. Plans to be bought to the next meeting. NOTED.
- (d) Refurbishment of Public Toilet: The work has been completed and the toilet is open daily. NOTED.
- (e) Mitchell Village Hall: Cornwall Council has instructed Lodge & Thomas to undertake a valuation and is waiting for the report. They will then be able to confirm the selling price. Sanctuary Housing has agreed in principle to transfer the open space land in the new development to the Parish Council and the Clerk is waiting for further information. AH asked if there had been any progress on the pre-application. The Clerk will follow-up with Mark Roberts. NOTED.
- (f) War Memorial Refurbishment: The two memorial benches have been installed. The Clerk had contacted two stone masons for a quote to do the refurbishment work as per the scope of the grant. The quote including improvements to the Horace Curtis Memorial Stone was £1000. The Clerk felt that the work required in submitting a full grant application was not commensurate with the amount of grant that could be applied for. She had also received a quote to install some planters and was waiting for a revised quote for the handrail. The whole project could be completed for £5000. There is £10,000 in the Precept and it was discussed that the remaining £5000 could be used towards the new play equipment. RESOLVED: Clerk to proceed with the refurbishment of the War Memorial & ask for further details on the planter quote. Project to cost no more than £5000 with the remaining £5000 vired to the Playground Refurbishment Fund. NOTED.
- (g) Affordable Housing Freedom of Information Request: A response has been received from Cornwall Council. DL felt the answer was dissatisfactory and would continue researching the issue. Item to come off the agenda until further information is available. NOTED.
- (h) Refurbishment of Wesley Hall: MH had left the meeting & the Clerk did not know if he had got the quotes for the upstairs toilet & kitchen yet. She will chase. NOTED.
- (i) Open Space Land at Tinners Croft: The Clerk read out the response from Ocean Housing. They confirmed that two 'landscaped areas' have been sold. A third 'extremely negligible' section of land is being transferred to an existing owner. There is no intention of completing any further sales. They also confirmed that residents are not being charged to maintain the areas that have been sold. These areas have never been included as part of the service agreement. NOTED. The poor condition of the eco-area was discussed. RESOLVED: Clerk to contact Ocean to ask if they would consider transferring the land to the Parish Council.
- (j) Installation of Street Lights between Tinners Croft & The Cross: The Clerk displayed the proposed plan for the lighting. RESOLVED: Parish Council to ask Cormac to proceed with the installation.
- (k) Installation of a New Dog Bin at Shepherds: The Clerk advised that currently the Council does not have the funding to install any new bins. Following discussions, it was RESOLVED that the Parish Council would purchase and install a new bin themselves.
- (l) Installation of Dropped Kerbs at Trewithen Parc: RS had looked into the matter. Every property has a dropped kerb & there are four at the entrance. It was discussed that as this is a low traffic, low speed area, the number of dropped kerbs is sufficient. NOTED.
- Business Matters:
- (a) Co-Option of New Councillors: Following the election, there are two vacancies, one for the SNE Ward and one for the Mitchell Ward. A co-option will take place at the June Meeting. NOTED.
- (b) Closed Churchyard Grasscutting Agreement 21/22: RESOLVED: Parish Council accepts the grant for 21/22. Clerk to return paperwork.
- (c) Adoption of the Revised Code of Conduct: The Clerk had circulated the revised version of the Code of Conduct. RESOLVED: Parish Council to adopt revised Code of Conduct with immediate effect.
- (d) Installation of No Parking Signs in Mitchell: ESP asked if it would be possible to install some signage at the Fair Park & Strawberry Field Housing Estate advising that the visitor parking spaces are available to all, as Fair Park View residents have been advising people that they are unable to park there. Following discussions, it was RE-SOLVED to seek clarification from Coastline as to who the parking spaces are for.
